Gardening Tips

Timing a transplant—late August is a good time to start thinking of transplanting perennials. Cooler temperatures and rainfall are more consistent at this time. This helps to reduce transplant shock and provides amiable conditions providing sufficient time for the plants to settle in. Be sure to loosen up the soil before planting and add compost to the area. Water well at the time of planting.

At this time of the year many garden centres usually offer some good deals. So be sure to visit some of the great garden centres in our area, especially those offering our members a discount on purchases. David Petrie recommends not cultivating too deeply around your plants, especially during dryer periods. This helps to maintain moisture in the soil and prevents disturbing surrounding plant roots.
