## **Weird Winter Weather**

The recent warm, wet weather has our gardens confused! In some areas, crocus are pushing through, maple sap has been running for weeks and trees are budding. Hopefully our area is still cold enough to avoid the worst of it. Here are some of the possible negative consequences:

- Plants that sprout early in warm weather will be stressed by subsequent cold snaps (and possibly killed off for this year)
- Lack of snow means less protection for seeds and plants—they might not survive.
- Warm temperatures and lack of snow could mean more pests survive winter, so it could be extra buggy this gardening season.
- The dry winter could leave perennials stressed, and a wet spring will help.

Hope we get lots of April showers!
