I'm excited to get gardening again! I must apologize for this newsletter arriving after the beginning of May, but I had to take time this week to repot tomato seedlings. I was too busy last year to start seeds and I missed it. I first grew my own tomatoes in 2020 during lockdown, and I haven't looked back. This year 27 of 30 seeds grew, and I hope to have some extras to donate to the plant sale. I have only a south facing window (no grow lights) so some of them get quite leggy, but it's so satisfying to grow a plant from a seed.

It's also satisfying (and fun!) to enter your flowers, houseplants and designs in our shows. I'm hopeful we'll have some members entering shows for the first time this year. Give it a try!

And as always, be prepared to enter our photography competition in October by taking photos throughout the year. The trick to winning the Johansen Plaque is to enter every category. This spring you should be grabbing photos of early spring blooms for the "Springing Up" category.

Enter Your Daffodils

Many of your flower arrangements made at this time of year, whether as a design entry at our show or for your own pleasure, will include daffodils.

Arranging daffodils in floral foam creates a problem for the designer. Daffodil stems are hollow, so when you attempt to insert the stem the end usually splits apart.



Therefore, a good tip is, cut a thin plastic straw into a piece approximately 1 ½ in (3.8 cm) long. Once you have cut the daffodil stem to the desired length carefully insert the straw into the bottom of the stem leaving 1/2 inch outside the stem. Then the daffodil is ready to be inserted into the foam. Otherwise consider using a pin holder (frog/Kenzan) or chicken wire as your mechanics in your design.

When you cut your daffodils for our May 7 show, remember they aren't shown with leaves, but almost all other flowers should be entered with leaves. When in doubt, include the leaves and our helpful show coordinators will let you know to cut them off before placing your entry.
